Jos Huigen (OPTA and conference coordinator)

Director of Broadband and Broadcasting at OPTA. Has worked there since 1995, with the exception of one year when he worked for US CRM-application service provider. Before joining OPTA, he was assistant professor Public Administration and Public Policy at Tilburg University. Has published on ICT in general and ICT in government and on public decision making about large scale infrastructure projects.

Paul de Bijl (CPB and conference coordinator)

Head of the Sector Competition and Regulation at the CPB Netherlands Bureau for Economic Policy Analysis. One of his research programs focuses on network industries. Until recently, he was the research coordinator at TILEC (Tilburg Law & Economics Center), Tilburg University. He is author of the book *Regulation and Entry into Telecommunications Markets* (with Martin Peitz), published by Cambridge University Press. Paul de Bijl has published on various network competition and regulation issues.

Andrew Odlyzko (University of Minnesota)

Head of the University of Minnesota's Digital Technology Center. His research includes papers on computational complexity, cryptography, number theory, coding theory, analysis, probability theory, electronic publishing, electronic commerce, and the economics of data networks.

Martin Cave (Warwick Business School)

Professor and Director of the Centre for Management under Regulation at Warwick Business School. He specializes in regulatory economics and has advised a number of regulatory bodies in the UK and Europe. He was a member of the Competition Commission from 1996 to 2002. His research focuses on economic regulation of industry, especially the communications industry, and competition law and policy.

Nico Baken (Delft University of Technology)

Professor at Delft University of Technology and Senior Consultant and Chief Architect at Royal KPN Corporate Strategy and Innovation. His main interest concerns Broadband Networks and Services. As such he is responsible for the co-ordination of both operational and strategic research in interaction with TNO ICT. He takes part in the *national expert group broadband* and the Andriessen committee to deal with the feasibility of FTTH for the city of the Hague. He recently introduced new concepts to enhance and accelerate ict-applications in and across sectors such as healthcare, transport and education.

Johan Pouwelse (Delft University of Technology)

Senior member of the Peer-to-Peer team at Delft University of Technology. Recently, he conducted one of the largest measurements of P2P networks. The detailed measurement study ran over a period of two years and discovered many unique properties of the worlds largest P2P file sharing system, called Bittorrent. Recently he testified in Washington for the Federal Trade Commission hearing on P2P file sharing.

Inge Bernaerts (European Commission, DG Competition)

Inge Bernaerts was a member of the Brussels bar from 1996 until 2003, working for two leading international law firms where she mainly practised European competition law with a particular emphasis on network industries. In parallel she taught practical seminars on European law at the university of Leuven. In September 2003, she joined the Competition Directorate General of the European Commission, as a Project Manager responsible for Article 7 notifications in the Unit for telecommunications, post and information society coordination, also dealing with antitrust cases in those sectors. She has published and lectured extensively, including on the application of European competition law in the electronic communications industry.

Maarten Janssen (Director Tinbergen Institute Rotterdam)

Professor of Microeconomics at Erasmus University Rotterdam, Director of the Tinbergen Institute and co-founder of ECRI (The Erasmus Competition and Regulation Institute). Maarten Janssen's academic research focuses on issues in the theory of industrial organization in general, and on asymmetric information in markets (search, adverse selection) and auctions, in particular. As a consultant, he advised a number of (international) telecom institutions.

Sean Ennis (OECD Competition Division)

Senior economist in the Competition Division of the OECD. He is responsible for the work programme related to competition and regulation. Prior to this he practiced as an economist at DG Competition's the Merger Task Force and the Antitrust Division of the U.S. Department of Justice. His professional writings have focused on telecommunications, health care and network industries.

Pierre Larouche (Tilburg University)

Professor of Competition Law and Vice-Director, Tilburg Law and Economics Centre (TILEC), University of Tilburg. His research focuses on competition law and sector-specific regulation in network industries. This year, he has published -with 2 co-authors - on regulatory reform in the postal sector, as well as on the Dutch experience with regulatory authorities (for a comparative study).

Martin Peitz (International University of Germany and University of Mannheim)

Professor of Economics and Quantitative Methods at the School of Business Administration, International University in Germany and University of Mannheim. He is author of the book Regulation and Entry into Telecommunications Markets (with Paul de Bijl), published by Cambridge University Press. His research includes work on the regulation of media and telecommunications markets, on intellectual property rights, and on trust and reputation in markets.

Robert Stil (OPTA)

After studying Economics at the University of Amsterdam Robert Stil held positions at the Competition Directorate of the Dutch Ministry of Economic Affairs, the European

Commission and the Netherlands Competition Authority. Since 2000, Robert works at the Independent Post and Telecommunications Authority (OPTA), where he has fulfilled the role of deputy head of Strategy, coordinator of market analysis, and presently head of the Economic Analysis Team.

Christian Wey (TU/DIW Berlin)

Head of the department Information Society and Competition at the German Institute for Economic Research (DIW Berlin). Professor of Economics at the Technical University Berlin. Member of the Industrial Economics Group of the German Economic Association and a research affiliate of the Centre of Economic Policy Research in London. His recent research subjects include merger analysis and the emergence of effective competition in telecommunications markets.

Joost van der Vleuten (Ministry of Economic Affairs)

Joost van der Vleuten (Ministry of Economic Affairs, the Netherlands): senior policy advisor at the Directorate of Coordination, Strategy and International Affairs of the Directorate-general for Energy and Telecom. Projectmanager of 'The Future of Electronic Communications' (TEC) and 'Media and Electronic Communications'. Co-author (with Judith Duveen) of the OECD-paper Policy Considerations for Audio-visual Content Distribution in a Multiplatform Environment (2006) with an annex report on Convergence and Broadcasting Regulation in 13 Countries.

Nico van Eijk (Institute for Information Law)

Professor at IVIR, Institute for Information Law (University of Amsterdam), by special appointment of Media and Telecommunications Law. He is the Vice-Chairman of the Dutch Federation for Media and Communications Law. He has published on various telecoms regulation issues.

Annetje Ottow (Institute for Information Law, Associate member of the Commission of OPTA)

Associate member of the Commission of OPTA , the Netherlands Independent Post and Telecommunications Authority. She has been a lawyer in private practice from 1990-2006 and since 2001 a lecturer at the institute IVIR, Institute for Information Law (University of Amsterdam). Annetje Ottow is specialized in competition and telecommunications law. Her research interest involves economic surveillance, especially in the telecommunications area.

Jens Arnbak (Delft University of Technology)

Professor of Telematics. Member of Advisory Councils of (1) ICTRegie, a body advising the Ministries of Economic Affairs and of Education & Science, (2) SURF Gigaport and (3) "Delft Cluster". Founding Chairman of OPTA (1997-2005). Founding Chairman of European Regulators Group (ERG, 2002-2003). Publications on: systems engineering of mobile and other electronic networks, regulation of electronic communication markets, and radiocommunications. Member of the Telecommunications Appeals Boards of Denmark and Guernsey

Alexandre de Stree (European University Institute)

Lecturer at the Faculty of Economics and the Centre for Computer and Law (CRID) of the University of Namur. He specializes in regulatory and competition policy applied to network industries. He worked at the Policy Unit of DG Information Society and Media of the European Commission from 2000 to 2003 on the elaboration and the negotiation of the European Regulatory Framework.
